MASS FOR THOSE WHO HAVE DIED SINCE LAST NOVEMBER: At 11.00 am Mass on Sunday 9th November, the faithful departed of our parishes who have died during the last year will be prayed for and remembered by name. A letter will be sent to their families inviting them to attend.

would go as far as to say that if there was no purgatory, then we would have to invent it, for who would dare say of himself that he was able to stand directly before God. And yet we don't want to be, to use an image from Scripture, 'a pot that turned out wrong,' that has to be thrown away; we want to be able to be put right. Purgatory basically means that God can put the pieces back together again. That he can cleanse us in such a way that we are able to be with him and can stand there in the fullness of life. Purgatory strips off from a person what is unbearable and from another the inability to bear certain things, so that in each of them a pure heart is revealed, and we can see that we all belong together in one enormous symphony of being." (Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI)

During November, the weekend and weekday Masses will be offered in the parishes for departed priests, friends and family. (For this reason particular Mass intentions requested will be carried forward to December.) Please take a November List from the back of the church and add the names of those you would like to pray for, and place it in the basket beside the altar. If you are able you may make a Mass offering with your November list. The names of your loved ones whom you wish to be remembered this month will be inserted within the album at the altar.

All the faithful can seek to obtain a plenary indulgence for a soul in Purgatory. And if we help get someone to Heaven, you can be sure that they will help us and pray for us before the Throne of God

Requirements for Obtaining a Plenary Indulgence on All Souls Day: Piously visit a church to pray for the faithful departed; - Say one "Our Father" and the "Creed" in the visit to the church; - Say one "Our Father" and one "Hail Mary" for the intentions of the Pope; - Worthily receive Holy Communion (ideally on the same day); - Make a Sacramental Confession within a week of (before or after) All Souls Day; - That one be free from all attachment to sin, even venial sin.

Requirements for Obtaining a Plenary Indulgence from November 1st to 8th: Devoutly visit a cemetery and pray for the dead; - Say one "Our Father" and one "Hail Mary" for the intentions of the Pope; - Worthily receive Holy Communion (ideally on the same day); - Make a Sacramental Confession within a week of (before or after) All Souls Day; - That one be free from all attachment to sin, even venial sin.



GALLOWAY YOUNG ADULTS WALK THE CAMINO DE SANTIAGO

12th – 19th October 2025

Last week, a group of eleven Young Adults from across the Diocese set out on a pilgrimage to walk the final section of the Camino de Santiago, following the French way. They walked from Sarria to Santiago, a distance of approximately 115km over 5 days.



The group included 7 parishioners from St Joseph's, alongside parishioners from Auchinleck, Dumfries, and Largs and was led by Fr Kevin, Fr Stephen, and Margaret.

Each day, the group walked between 19km and 30km, taking between 6-10 hours with stops. On their longest day, Wednesday, they covered 30km, setting out at 0730 and arriving at 1830. Whilst the distance each day was long, and at times the terrain very challenging, the group weren't walking the Camino simply for exercise. Each member of the group was on a spiritual journey, walking the Camino for their own reasons, and carrying with them their own intentions, and the intentions of the wider Diocesan community.

Over the course of the week the group grew not only in faith, but also in friendship with one and other, and it was both this faith and friendship which helped to carry them through each day — when members struggled, others helped, when members felt it was too much, they were encouraged by the group around them. Over the five days, each member of the group was on a spiritual journey seeking Christ with great clarity in their lives: asking for help in some ways in their lives, some for healing, some to come to a deeper knowledge of him. For many of the group, they set out seeking or asking for one grace, but receiving innumerable others in different areas of their lives. As the group were reminded throughout the week, God knows that which we need the most, and at times that means he'll answer our prayers in a way that we do not expect.

THE IRON CROSS

Traditionally, at the highest point on the Camino pilgrims leave a pebble or a stone at the Iron Cross. This pebble or stone has been carried by them from wherever they started their journey and represents all of those things which distract them from Christ: their worries, concerns, distractions and vices — all of those things which separate them from Christ and which they're seeking healing for on their pilgrimage.



The group also carried with them two pebbles from Whithorn representing the needs and intentions of the wider Diocesan community, one of which was left as part of the stone cairn. Many of the group found the Iron Cross service to be hugely moving, representing not just a momentary change of heart, but a genuine desire for conversion and a transformation of heart in Christ. The group celebrated their Iron Cross on the Thursday morning, having walked over 80km, and, following the

service were encouraged to make the focus of their day's prayer a desire to see Christ more clearly: to hear, to know, and to love him in their lives.

ARRIVING INTO SANTIAGO

Whilst the Camino is a pilgrimage walked seeking Christ, there was nonetheless a tremendous elation on first reaching the Mount of Joy – a hill just outside Santiago from where the group first saw the spires of the Cathedral rising up in the distance – and then again walking into the Cathedral square. The group of 14 started out the week as a group, and whilst over the course of the week they'd sometimes walked at different paces, they had always walked as a group – and the end was no different. Walking into the heart of Santiago the group paused so that, as they set out as one group, so too would they arrive as one group. Arriving into the square, the group were accompanied by the sound of bagpipes: not the traditional Scottish type, but the smaller Galician type, however they were nonetheless a wonderful reminder of home.



The following day the group enjoyed the Pilgrims' Mass in the Cathedral as well as a tour of the old city and the Cathedral. The second Whithorn pebble which had been carried by the group was left at the tomb of St James, alongside any intentions which had been handed in, and representing those intentions carried in the group's hearts and from the wider Diocesan Community.

The pilgrimage was a transformational and once in a lifetime experience for many of the group, with the group remarking how much they had enjoyed it, and encountered Christ through it. While their Camino ended in Santiago, their journey continues: Santiago was the end of the beginning, but the journey that they embarked on from Sarria continues in their lives as they seek to continue to daily grow in knowledge and love of Christ.

The group is extremely grateful to all of those who donated to support their fundraisers and events in making the pilgrimage possible, and look forward to hosting an evening to share their stories in the near future – watch this space for more details.
